

Mickey and the Teamsters

A Fight for Fair Unions at Disney



Behind the costumes, life isn't always magic and fairy dust for the people who play the iconic characters of Mickey Mouse, Goofy, and Cinderella at Walt Disney World. *Mickey and the Teamsters* reveals the little-known story of Teamsters Local 385, the union that represents these performers. It spotlights Donna-Lynn Dalton, a former cast member who stood up for Disney performers against deep-rooted problems in the union. **Club mem-ber Mike Schneider**, a journalist for the Associated Press, will detail how the union prevented its members from leaving, severely mismanaged union business, and a culture of hostile leadership. Dalton brought issues to investigators, threatening her livelihood. The local union fired Dalton and harassed her and other union members.

Schneider offers a behind-the-scenes look at some of the struggles that surround Disney World, which employs the largest single-site workforce in the country. Through the efforts of Dalton and others to reform their union and improve the lives of the employees at the workplace they loved, he shows the importance of individual and collective action to hold unions accountable and preserve their potential to do good.


